

Overlooked cities: Shifting the gaze in global urban studies

Julia Wesely is a Postdoctoral Fellow in the Urban Studies Research Group at the Department of Geography. Her research and teaching focuses on the intersections of environmental (in-)justice, learning and knowledge (co-) production in and across the urban global South and North. This talk examines debates on these cities through the notion of overlooked cities to understand how knowledge from such cities is produced and circulated in urban research and practice. Based on her work with the Overlooked Cities Collective, Julia illustrates how different people, places, and practices remain intentionally or unintentionally marginalised, off-the-map and undertheorised in global urban studies, and with what consequences.
